### CREATIVITY Research Suggests We're All Getting Less Creative and Scientists Think They Know Why BY JESSICA STILLMAN

"A researcher at the University of William and Mary analyzed 300,000 Torrance Test scores since the '50s. She found that creativity scores began to nosedive in 1990. She concluded that we're now facing a 'creativity crisis," reported author Michael Easter on Medium recently. That sounds alarming, but the good news is that, unlike the decline in IQ scores, scientists have a pretty good guess what's causing our collective creativity to tank. Scientists blame "our hurried, over-scheduled lives" and "ever increasing amounts of (time) interacting with electronic entertainment devices, Easter explains. In short, we're too busy and entertained for creativity to blossom. Gone are the days where childhood was largely spent in unsupervised rambles and imaginary play. And we're generally just as overscheduled and overstimulated as adults. Many folks in the middle of midlife pandemonium struggle to find time to keep up with their email and brush their teeth, more or less putter and ponder. Which is just what creativity demands. Science shows that boredom actually

increases creativity, as do activities like long walks (and showers) that demand just enough attention to allow our minds to wander. Einstein understood this. That's why he spent hours floating on his sailboat letting his mind gestate the brilliant ideas that revolutionized our understanding of the cosmos. The good news is that just as scientists are clear about the cause of our "creativity crisis," they are clear on what individuals can do to reclaim their natural inventiveness. Actively scheduling time to think, reflect, and experiment into your days, putting reasonable boundaries on your use of passive tech), varying your routine and your company, and getting out for more long walks can all help ensure you're bucking the trend and nurturing your personal creativity.







The committee feels that a standard protocol for analyzing and evaluating art will benefit all artists and facilitate consistency and fairness of LAA"s competitions. *It will also serve to advance the knowledge, understanding, and practice of the arts.*


Please offer feedback to the committee members. Their ongoing intention is to review the processes annually and update as necessary.

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## In case you missed it, we were on KATC!

Thanks to Terry Palmer, Edward DeMahy and Vaugh Simpson for stepping up and doing a great interview with Scott Brasda, KATC.

It's been more than a year. That's a long time. But finally, finally, finally, Acadiana art instructors are able to resume teaching their craft in creative spaces. "Teachers are excited to get back into the classroom," says Lafayette Art Association President Terry Palmer. "They were really sad that last year they couldn't do anything." Drawing teacher Edward DeMahy concurs. "Oh, 2020 was kind of non-existent."

There are watercolors, and oils, and acrylics. You name the medium, you name tools, you name the surface, and there's a good chance the Lafayette Art Association can synergistically match you with a really good teacher. "People can learn how to oil paint, water color, they can learn to cut with a plasma cutter, and then paint that, we have mosaics."

"So when you heard that finally the Lafavette Art Association and the State and various other regulatory commissions were going to let you do this again, what was your first thought?" Oh, let's get it started," answers DeMahy. "We started up scheduling classes immediately and we're hoping to get the word out that we're doing it again."

"They lost a lot of--not revenue necessarily, but they love the teaching part of this and they enjoy teaching their students," adds Palmer.

And what about the students? Students who knew what they wanted to do, but just needed that guiding hand and expert knowledge?

"Having classes was like a re-entery into the world," says student Vaughan Simpson. "It's been sort of

In this workshop, you'll learn these tatting techniques: Rings & Chains (Reverse Work); How to use a picot gauge; Tatting with beads; Attaching to button; Weaving in the tails; How to open a closed ring; Adding in thread; & Front side/Back side tatting. Some simple supplies needed for workshop (size 10 thread, seed beads (size 6/0) and 3/4" button (2 or 4 hole). Max class size: 6 participants.

### **At The Hilliard**

### JOHN GARGANO: LE DÉTROIT IN DUST REE Thru Sep 11

In the broadest sense, John Gargano's installation Le Détroit In Dust Ree honors working people and the tools they use. While Gargano's ceramic objects projecting from the wall in the Hilliard's atrium have the playful appearance of a Rube Goldberg machine, his recreations of industrial machinery do a great deal of symbolic heavy lifting.

### KATE GORDON: ALLIGATOR NAPS Thru Aug 4

"The imagery I work with is largely stream of consciousness and dream based. As the individual images are cut up and re-stitched together, a nonsensical narrative often emerges focusing on the comically dark aspects of life. This feels very in step with the current pandemic moment which is, in my mind, akin to a fever dream." Kate Gordon

KHARA WOODS: AXIS Thru 12/18 Khara Woods uses materials, pattern, and abstraction to great effect. Her gridded hard-edge compositions incorporate warm wood grain with a bold, personable palette of saturated colors. The intensity of the color and tightly packed lines in this exhibition create a visual effect in each work of art whereby the bold colors and uniform patterns may cause a patient viewer to perceive vibrations and pulses across the face of each painting.

#### MINISCAPES: WHERE THE LAND MEETS THE MIND Thru 9/10

A collaboration between the Lafayette Parish School System Talented Visual Arts Program and the Hilliard Art Museum, students were challenged to make landscapes rooted in their own sense of place, relationships with the land, and history.

### NANCY MACKO: THE FRAGILE BEE Thru 8/25

Nancy Macko's exhibition The Fragile Bee presents pollinator conservation as an environmental justice issue with roots in 1970s Ecofeminism. Macko's bees are symbols of a movement that aims to undo the damage humans have wrought on our environment. Bees and other pollinators are animals we rely on. They deserve our respect because they are responsible for the vast majority of the food humans eat. In the context of Macko's art activism, advocating for bees is equal to advocating for ourselves.

## RAINE BEDSOLE: WATER AND DREAMS Thru 12/3

Other than a fortuitous reference to water, Heraclitus of Ephesus' aphorism, "No man ever steps in the same river twice, for it's not the same river and he's not the same man," provides the perfect framework for understanding Raine Bedsole's art and studio practice.

### SANCTUARY: NEW WORK BY LINDA ALTERWITZ

Thru Feb 11, 2022 This exhibit explores notions of refuge with an interdisciplinary approach and great psychological depth. Replete with photographs featuring landscape and architectural imagery, brain scans printed on gauze, simulated wind, and a musical score composed by Christian Tamburr, Alterwitz's installation feels like embarking on a journey inside one's own mind.

### UNIVERSE OF THE MIND): MASTER SHEN-LONG

Thru Jan 22, 2022 A multidisciplinary artist and a contemporary master of classical Chinese poetry, painting, calligraphy, and seal carving, Master Shen-Long merges these genres with contemporary art-making practices to create new interpretations of traditional culture.
